“ May I share with the family my deepest sympathy for your loss, in this life, of a husband, brother, father and grandfather. I know Chuck will be greatly missed by many family and friends.

Since I can't be there this week, I wanted to share a few stories about my cousin. Memories of Chuck will always be a solid part of my childhood and youth in Georgetown. So much Mississippi family and Chuck, Jay, Donyce and I were on the tail end of all the "happening years" with the older siblings and cousins, but Chuck certainly made my times in Mississippi memorable.

I just recently told him I had a bone to pick with him about how he, Jay and Donyce abandoned me in the covered area behind the store when we were romping around in the trailers full of cotton. He and Jay (apparently part monkey), jumped from one trailer to the next by grabbing the rafters above and swinging across the big gap between the trailers. Donyce had just enough crazy to do whatever they did and she was right on their heels as the 3 of them disappeared around the corner and into the field. My middle name was chicken, and I ended up in Aunt Ellen's house sitting with the "old folks" as they visited because I never could find them. I loved recalling this story with Chuck and Donyce this past August and seeing his face.

One story I hadn't thought of until just today - Donyce and I were hanging out at Chuck's during one of our many visits (I'm guessing Jay was there too) and we were playing hide and seek in the house. Now I'm not sure how little we were, but we were old enough that this part really embarrassed me - Chuck was "it" and the rest of us just scattered through Aunt Martha's house to hide. I thought (for some stupid reason) that would be a good opportunity to run to the potty but the sliding bathroom door didn't have a lock or I didn't know how to use it. I'm guessing when Chuck counted to 100, he skipped a few numbers because in no time.... Yep ...He found me first - right in the middle of taking care of business!!! I don't believe we EVER spoke of that.

Everyone knows how Chuck loved to talk. Well, there was one time he had very few words to say. When he was working off shore, he must have gotten into a fight with someone (or a bunch of someones) and took quite a lickin'. Debbie, Donyce and I went to the hospital to check on him and found his face in quite a mess, including having his jaw wired shut. That day, we girls did pretty much all the talking. Chuck was one of the toughest men I've known - obviously someone who learned how to survive a big brother like Don.

I hope you (Pam, Don, Susie and Chad) can know the peace God gives us when we lose the companionship of someone we love dearly, but know without a shadow of a doubt that our loved one is in the presence of The King and surrounded by His perfect love as well as so many other loved ones who have gone on before him. I will think of you often in the months to come and pray for you during this time of grief.
